On February 19, Leslie Campbell presented an excellent hands-on workshop on proper pruning of shrubs, particularly Texas Rangers, for new volunteers.

After instruction, folks worked in teams practicing on the many rangers in the garden. All enjoyed the learning experience and Leslie's patient assistance. On behalf of the volunteers and the shrubs, thanks much Leslie.

Currently the garden is brimming with blooming pink penstemon parryii, mounds of lavender desert verbena, bright yellow dyssodia, red chuparosa,

two types of aloe, and sweet scented cassia bushes scattered throughout.

With no rainfall in weeks and humidity levels remaining in single digits, soil and plants are drying out. It is time to get the hoses out and begin a hand-watering routine... this year earlier than usual.

HISTORIC CANOA RANCH (HCR) — Jack Davis and Raydine Tabor

The February 24th, workday at HCR, was a success. Jessie Byrd and new sidekick, Amy Belk, brought tools and containers from the Pima County Native Nursery(PCNN) to join our GVG team in cleaning out the extensive overgrown plants in the east planters at the Sr House, while preserving many small new growth items to take back to the PCNN. While Jessie served as quarterback for this operation, Byron Hinton received the 'most valuable player' award for strength and his amazing electric saws. This is not to downplay all of our other HCR volunteers who, thankfully, toiled side-by-side in the clean out there as well as our other projects. You are all so sincerely appreciated. The areas are now ready for planting at the workday, scheduled for Wednesday, March 16. This

process will occur just prior to the Gala Fundraiser for the public on March 19 at HCR. Many descendants of the Manning family are bringing new artifact collections, and will be present on the 3/19 event which will include donations to allow planting of native hackberry trees (Celtis reticulate) along the road into HCR.

Then comes the second annual Heritage Fair, Saturday, March 26 (9am-4pm) at HCR which is usually attended by hundreds of visitors. We will have tables and educational materials available for the public, as well as information on other GVG projects and flyers to advertise and, possibly, sell tickets for our Garden Tour on April 9,2016.

The new Courtyard garden, at the Jr Home, has now been designed by landscape architect, Jessie Byrd from PCNN, and our GVG team. While it may be a while before we will be planting, as we are waiting on final approval, gutter placement and installation of irrigation, the basic design diagram will be posted on the door in the Jr House, which leads to the courtyard garden area. Looks like March Madness will extend into April, and beyond, for the HCR as well as the many other GVG projects.

OGDEN COMMUNITY GARDEN - George Stone

As we enter February there are 54 Adult Gardeners & 14 children who are enjoying gardening on a daily basis. The garden has 20 in ground plots, 2 of those are onion project plots. There are 5 raised beds dedicated to those with physical challenges and 3 raised beds that are dedicated to those that are physically handicapped. One in ground bed is available for assignment, the remainder are assigned.

Our 2016 onion project with almost 2,000 onions planted are considered under stress with damage to at least 30 % of the crop. Lorna & Fred Mitchell, who are in charge of production are making evaluations on a daily basis. Plans for an independent budget are being developed but at the present time we have suspended all budget plans until we have a better grasp on our situation.

Last month our girl scout troop #471 held a first day cookie sale event at the garden. Troop leader Brandi McAnally reports \$100.00 in sales were made by the Ogden gardeners. The event actually drew only 2 people. All other sales were made via 8 gardeners calling Brandi and making the purchases. Brandi reports this year's proceeds from the troops cookie sales are earmarked for the girls to experience a summer trip to the Grand Canyon.
