Canoa Ranch is a microcosm of the history of our land and our people and the story of this special place encapsulates many of the narratives of Southern Arizona.

- 1995 Fairfield Homes purchases Canoa Ranch for development
- 1997 Pima County voters approve \$2 million in bond funds to purchase Canoa Ranch with another \$200,000 for rehabilitation
- 1997 Pima County Board of Supervisors purchases 4,800 acres for \$6.6 million
- 2004 Voters approve an additional \$3 million
- 2007 Phases I III of rehabilitation completed
- 2013 Remaining bond funds used for Phase IV construction








